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PUBLIC SAFETY

CSAFE Promising Practices

- Both Howard County Heightened Enforcement Accountability and Treatment (HEAT) teams, **Long Reach** and **Harper's Choice**, have a representative from the local detention center that provides a monthly list of offenders returning to the CSAFE areas within the next 60 days. Information is provided during case staffing to lead to a seamless transition from institutional to community supervision. Other HEAT teams with linkages to local detention centers include **Chestertown, Cambridge, Pioneer City, International Corridor** and **Germantown**.
- The **Pioneer City** HEAT team officer invited a local judge to participate in a ride along of the CSAFE area. This provided the judge with a first-hand perspective about loitering, nuisance and other quality of life issues.
- A federal probation pretrial agent regularly participates in the **Edgewood** HEAT team meetings. This ensures comprehensive supervision of all offenders in the CSAFE area.
- Information exchanged between the **Salisbury Westside** team and the community resulted in an award of \$1,160.00 in Weed and Seed funds to install 16 new streetlights in the CSAFE area.
- Representatives from US Citizenship and Immigration Services collaborate with the **International Corridor** HEAT team to exchange photos, offender profiles and other pertinent information.
- Department of Juvenile Services Spotlight on Schools (SOS) workers attend HEAT team meetings to share information about juvenile offenders of mutual concern. Examples include **Suitland, Taneytown** and **Wheaton**.
- The **Westlake** juvenile counselor is also the Spotlight on Schools worker. The counselor and the school resource officer conduct joint home visits in the CSAFE area.
- The **Taneytown** HEAT team officer has educated preschoolers and day care participants about personal safety.

- The **International Corridor and Parole** HEAT teams invite gang specialists to speak at team meetings.
- The **Denton** HEAT team registers all adult probation cases on the police Computer Assisted Dispatch (CAD) system. This practice ensures that all officers know about CSAFE offenders. In addition, the CSAFE officer notifies all HEAT team members about any contact CSAFE offenders have with Denton police officers.
- The **International Corridor** HEAT team and the Montgomery County Housing Department are collaborating to improve pedestrian safety in the Takoma Park area.
- All Montgomery County Division of Parole & Probation supervisors review Montgomery County warrants and “hot cases.” Information is forwarded to the Montgomery County Police Department webmaster. The webmaster prepares an updated document that is shared with police officers during roll call. This practice began as a CSAFE initiative and was institutionalized countywide.
- Most HEAT teams maintain offender identification books. In addition some teams provide “Most Wanted” photos to display at roll call for all officers. The **Frederick, Parole** and **Princess Anne** HEAT teams are examples.
- A video camera system was installed in the **Denton, Hagerstown** and **Frederick** CSAFE areas to provide constant surveillance of known open-air drug markets.
- The **Bay Hundred** HEAT team collaborates with four different law enforcement agencies to provide supervision for all offenders within the CSAFE area. These agencies include the Maryland State Police, Natural Resources Police, Talbot County Sheriff’s Office and St. Michaels Police Department.
- Parole and probation warrants issued in the **Gaithersburg** catchment CSAFE area are forwarded to the **Germantown** CSAFE officer for service.
- Officers from the Frederick City Police Department conduct joint home visits with all Division of Parole & Probation agents. This practice originated with the **Frederick** HEAT team and has been institutionalized citywide.

- Arrest information and digital photos are being shared between the Salisbury Police Department and the Office of the Wicomico County Sheriff's Office in the **Salisbury Westside** CSAFE area.
- The **Hagerstown** HEAT team officer collaborates with the Division of Parole & Probation's warrant unit to provide current digital photos and valid addresses to warrant officers.
- When youth bicycle gangs became a problem in Grantsville, members of the **Grantsville** HEAT team and the Assistant State's Attorney worked together to ticket and prosecute youth and young adults involved in gang activity.
- Several HEAT teams have a dedicated assistant state's attorney assigned as a core member of the team. These individuals work with law enforcement and probation to provide a continuum of services as a case progresses through the legal system. Examples include **Grasonville, Grantsville, Crisfield, International Corridor, Lexington Park, Harper's Choice** and **Long Reach**.
- **Crisfield** HEAT team members conducted surveillance for the Bay Hundred HEAT team at a party where underage drinking was suspected.
- The Montgomery County Office of the State's Attorney has liaisons that attend Division of Parole & Probation unit meetings. This practice has evolved from CSAFE partnerships and allows for valuable information to be exchanged.
- HEAT team members from **Berlin** and **Pocomoke City** hold joint meetings, exchanging information about transient residents who migrate between the two CSAFE areas.
- Officers assigned to the **Smallwood** HEAT team have increased their visibility in the community by adding foot and bike patrols to the CSAFE area.
- The Caroline County Drug Task Force works closely with members of the **Denton** HEAT team to conduct search and seizure warrant operations in the CSAFE area.
- The Drug Task Force shares information with **Grasonville** HEAT team members. The information often provides team members the ability to intervene with offenders in a timely manner.

- Members of the **Westlake** HEAT team receive information about problems in the CSAFE area as the result of officers attending Homeowner's Association meetings and Property Management meetings for the local apartment complexes.
- Members of the **Brooklyn Heights** HEAT team maintain good public relations with the community. Officers make hundreds of contacts with citizens to address concerns and ensure safety throughout the community. Continued high visibility in the CSAFE area has been very successful.
- Specialized units of the Baltimore County Police Department work closely with the **Riverview** HEAT team to exchange information about offenders and initiatives within the CSAFE area. Often detectives and police representatives from specialty areas such as gang intelligence attend HEAT team meetings to exchange information.
- The Juvenile Services worker and officers from the **Hillendale** CSAFE area engage juvenile offenders to participate in community clean-ups and other activities.
- Many HEAT teams hold offender orientations. This is an opportunity for digital photos to be taken, guest speakers to provide information about employment or treatment, and for the team and the offenders to meet and gain an increased understanding of what it means to live in a CSAFE area. The following HEAT teams have participated in this practice: **Hillendale, Woodmoor, Chestertown, Long Reach, East Baltimore North** and **Cherry Hill**.
- The **Frostburg** HEAT team has access to an afterschool program for youth. This provides youth with a safe place to participate in structured activities.
- **Edgewood** HEAT team probation agents and their supervisor attended roll calls at the Harford County Sheriff's Office. This was an informational exchange about how the team and all of the deputies can make the community a safer place.
- In **Crisfield**, the HEAT team has become known as a place where local youth can get popsicles in the summer and candy year round. This open door policy allows for positive exposure and valuable exchanges between local youth and team members. During one interaction, a team member was able to remove a tire iron from a youth's possession.

- Officer Sasser of the **Woodmoor** team obtains warrant tracking information from CSAFE agents. He enters this information in his laptop and also forwards it to other officers in the area so all warrants can be served as quickly as possible. Furthermore, Officer Sasser reviews the status of any and all outstanding warrants at each weekly HEAT team meeting.
- **Hagerstown** HEAT team members have lunch with senior citizens at the local senior center.
- Two armed robberies occurred in the Crisfield area. Police officers in Crisfield provided a description of the suspect to the DPP agent assigned to the **Crisfield** team. The agent noted that a recent parolee from Baltimore moved to Crisfield and matched the description of the suspect. Information on the parolee was given to the police and the parolee was subsequently determined to be the one who committed the robberies.
- Police officers working with the **Hillendale** HEAT team regularly make up flyers of wanted persons to be displayed on bulletin boards at police stations. Information on the suspects is also shared at police roll calls. Police investigators in the Hillendale area maintain regular contact with the team members to exchange information.
- A Maryland State Police trooper in Harford County was able to obtain valuable information about a shooting investigation by participating in a joint home visit with the DPP agent from the **Edgewood** HEAT team.
- The **Church Street** HEAT team invited a local assistant state's attorney to come along on home visits. The prosecutor came away with a greater understanding of offenders and their environments, factors that will help in making decisions about future cases.
- A captain from the Talbot County Detention Center has joined the **Easton** HEAT team, proving to be a valuable asset. The team now has access to information about offenders scheduled to be released from the detention center.
- The mother of a parolee assigned to the **Berlin** HEAT team called police to report that her son was selling drugs from her house. The parolee had a history of mental health and drug problems. Police placed the parolee under surveillance and observed him selling crack cocaine. As the result of information sharing, the DPP agent on the team requested an emergency parole retake warrant. The Berlin police arrested the parolee within hours of the warrant being issued.

- The Salisbury Police Department's warrant squad works closely with the **Church Street** HEAT team to furnish valuable information to DPP agents about offenders' activities in the community and to serve Violation of Probation (VOP) warrants as quickly as possible.
- The **Church Street** HEAT team partnered with representatives of the Wicomico County EXILE Program to film a documentary about the program. The film will be shown in schools, at public events, and possibly local television stations.
- A representative from the Division of Correction's facility in Hagerstown attends HEAT team meetings with the **Hagerstown** team. This representative provides valuable information regarding offenders who are about to be released, and also information about gang activities within the facility.
- The police precinct in the **Riverview** CSAFE area has a log of all outstanding warrants issued by the court. The Riverview HEAT team members regularly review the log to determine whether or not warrants have been issued for any offenders in the CSAFE area. This allows agents and officers to take prompt action to have these warrants served.
- The **Woodmoor** HEAT team uses an individualized crime statistical map to show where specific types of crimes are occurring and keep abreast of emerging crime trends. The mapping software is very detailed and can, for example, show whether burglars are gaining entry via front doors or rear windows. By sharing this information with the community, the team helps area residents learn how to protect them from crime. Citizen On Patrol (COP) groups use the information to determine when and where to target their patrol activities.
- **Grantsville** HEAT team member Sgt. Jeff Murphy of the Garrett County Sheriff's Office developed and has been conducting self-defense tactics training for women in the Grantsville area. Numerous women's groups have participated including local bank employees, afterschool personnel, high school seniors, DPP agents and Department of Social Services personnel. The intensive and realistic training has been well received and a former high school student who received the training, successfully used the defense tactics during an attempted assault on her while she was at college.

- Members of the **Hagerstown** HEAT team were invited to observe a special operation by the Hagerstown Police Department and other law enforcement agencies. Law enforcement officers observed traffic that was approaching a bar that has been the source of numerous citizen complaints. Routine traffic stops were conducted and the adult DPP agents were able to provide information about wanted persons. As a result of this collaboration, two outstanding warrants were served, three DWI arrests were made, three Controlled Dangerous Substance (CDS) citations were issued along with various motor vehicle citations. Representatives from the Fire Marshall's Office and Liquor Board played an active role in this operation by observing the number of patrons in the establishment. They were also able to collect information that would be presented to the Liquor Board at a future licensing hearing.
- A sex offender released from the Division of Corrections to the Grantsville area re-offended within two days. The family of the victim discussed the situation with a DSS worker who is also a **Grantsville** HEAT team member. The DSS worker, officer, and DPP agent from the team were instrumental in ensuring that the offender was re-arrested as quickly as possible.

EDUCATION/EMPLOYMENT

CSAFE Promising Practices

- HEAT team officers work proactively to create positive relationships with students during school events such as Career Day. Examples include **Woodmoor, Taneytown, Wheaton** and **Salisbury Westside**.
- Community police officers have worked with local schools to develop emergency lock-down programs for students and school personnel that could be utilized in the event of an emergency.
- High school students have been invited to “shadow” the community police officer in the **Taneytown** CSAFE area through participation in ride along activities.
- A representative from Goodwill Industries made a presentation to the **Frederick** HEAT team about the availability of volunteer positions. In return for their time, volunteers receive resume writing and other skill building services.
- The **Pioneer City** HEAT team started the PASS program. PASS is an acronym that stands for People Acquiring Skills for Success. Participants can learn valuable skills relating to employment, family life and other quality of life activities. The PASS program, which is funded by a Federal grant, is held at the Meade Village Boy’s and Girl’s Club.
- Members of the **CHMS** HEAT team conduct mock job interviews to educate offenders about the importance of proper attire and other helpful tips.
- The Superintendent of the Anne Arundel County Public School District was looking for a way to provide services to students who have been suspended from school. Following a meeting with representatives of the Superintendent’s office, the Governor’s Office of Crime Control and Prevention and the Advanced and Specialized Training Unit, it was determined that alternative school services could be offered at the three CSAFE sites throughout the county. Pupil Personnel Workers have been working with both students and HEAT team members to provide services to youth who are not able to attend school in **Brooklyn Heights, Pioneer City**, and **Parole**.



- The lead local coordinator for the **Federalsburg** CSAFE team is also the mayor. Together with the HEAT team the coordinator helped organize a job fair that has become an annual event. In May 2003, the fair attracted 24 employers and 150 applicants. Other CSAFE areas that facilitate job fairs include **Cherry Hill** and **Long Reach**.

TREATMENT/HEALTH/SUPPORT

CSAFE Promising Practices

- The **Cherry Hill** HEAT team sponsored a health fair that was attended by offenders and their family members. The participants received information about general health matters including substance abuse services and mental health counseling.
- The **Crisfield** HEAT team met with the Somerset County Department of Social Services to discuss housing problems and code compliance. The discussion specifically focused on parents who do not provide a clean home environment for their children.
- A treatment specialist from the Anne Arundel County Health Department is a core team member of the **Brooklyn Heights** HEAT team. The specialist participates in case staffing and conducts assessments for offenders. **Hagerstown, Harper's Choice, Long Reach, Cambridge, Deep Creek, Bay Hundred, Berlin, Pocomoke City, Crisfield, Princess Anne** and **Chestertown** teams also include treatment personnel.
- Several HEAT teams have representatives from the Department of Social Services as core team members. **Princess Anne, Berlin, Grantsville, International Corridor** and **Pocomoke City** are examples. These representatives are usually associated with Child Protective Services or Domestic Violence offices.
- The **Salisbury** HEAT teams invited the juvenile counselor assigned to the Drug Court to attend HEAT team meetings and participate in joint home visits.
- The **East Baltimore North** HEAT team facilitated a women's support group at the HEAT team office.
- The **Woodmoor** and **Wheaton** Neighborhood Safety Teams review public information such as bulletins from the University of Maryland Center for Substance Abuse Research (CESAR). This practice helps inform communities about substance abuse trends.

- Every HEAT team receives weekly faxes from the Drug Early Warning Systems (DEWS) providing information about current substance abuse trends in Maryland.
- The **Riverview** HEAT team noticed that a female offender with Substance abuse problems and a history of mental illness did not respond well to males. Therefore, the team arranged for a female officer to conduct a home visit to evaluate the offender and encourage her to keep appointments with the Health Department.
- The **Pocomoke City** HEAT team recently added a member of the area Crisis Response Team. The representative attends meetings prepared with incident reports and information about mentally ill offenders.
- The **Woodmoor** HEAT team developed a grid by which the team members monitor the progress of clients assigned to the CSAFE area. The grid highlights key areas of concern and allows the team to focus on pertinent information. As cases are presented and the grid is utilized, the team brainstorms on how to most effectively work with the client and provide services. By revisiting the case at regular intervals, the Woodmoor team ensures that clients receive proactive supervision.
- The **Taneytown** HEAT team members have partnered with Junction, Inc. to provide substance abuse treatment to clients residing in Taneytown. A Junction, Inc. counselor is seeing juvenile and adult probationers in the conference room of the Taneytown Police Department.
- A counselor with the First Step, Inc. treatment program has been assessing DPP clients at the Baltimore County Courthouse. After being approached by the **Scotts Branch** HEAT team members, the counselor agreed to also evaluate clients assigned to the CSAFE area. The counselor has since of both the HEAT and Neighborhood Safety teams. In addition to providing valuable substance abuse information to the teams, the counselor has joined with the DPP Agent in developing a Literacy Works program for the Scotts Branch team.

VICTIMS' SERVICES

CSAFE Promising Practices

- The Mid-Shore Council on Family Violence works with the **Denton, Chestertown, Federalsburg** and **Cambridge** HEAT teams to decrease incidents of domestic violence. The representative shares resource information and participates in case staffing.
- The **Grantsville, Hillendale, Riverview, Deep Creek, Scott's Branch, Yorkway** and **Woodmoor** HEAT teams include domestic violence workers. These workers provide information about the status of cases and participate in joint home visits.
- Officers from the **Yorkway** HEAT team participate in a program where hairstylists receive training on how to make appropriate referrals for customers who appear to be victims of domestic violence. There is a belief that women share information with their hairstylists. To date more than 70 stylists have been trained.
- A partnership has been established with U-Haul to help victims who need to relocate. Officers from the **Yorkway** HEAT team have participated in the development of this partnership.

COMMUNITY

CSAFE Promising Practices

- The **Washington Village** HEAT team worked with the community and Verizon to remove pay phones from bus stops to decrease communication among suspected drug dealers.
- Numerous teams participate in community events to promote awareness of partnerships between the community and public safety professionals. For example, in April 2002, the **Deep Creek** HEAT team participated in a tree planting activity with community members to raise awareness for Victims Advocate Week.
- Many communities offer summer activities to encourage residents to become more active. The **Hagerstown** community sponsored free concerts in the park between June and August 2002. These types of events provide team members an opportunity to interact with community residents while also providing an opportunity to observe their offenders.
- The Pocomoke Area Community Service Center provides meeting space to the **Pocomoke City** HEAT team. Utilizing joint space provides access to social services, education and employment services offered through the center. This partnership also provides the opportunity for offenders to make a contact with a counselor or service provider immediately. The **Washington Village** HEAT team is in a similar community building and its members are able to provide referrals to substance abuse counseling, employment services and housing assistance through this "One-Stop Shop."
- The **International Corridor**, **Washington Village** and **Wheaton** HEAT teams have all participated in graffiti removal projects. These teams engage youth with community service requirements to help clean and paint areas that have been marred by graffiti.
- Many HEAT teams including **Crisfield**, **Parole**, **Riverview**, **Westlake** and **Smallwood Village** participate in holiday and back-to-school events. These events include collecting and distributing school supplies, turkeys, holiday meals and Christmas gifts.

- Members of the **Washington Village** and **Wheaton** Neighborhood Safety Teams invite local bar managers to attend meetings. Residents are able to voice concerns about noise and loitering to the bar managers for resolution.
- The Howard County Office of Human Rights delivered a presentation to agencies within the **Harper's Choice** CSAFE area. This presentation provided methods to decrease racism.
- The **Hagerstown** community honored representatives of schools, afterschool programs, summer camps and members of the HEAT team. Participants celebrated five years of successful community partnerships.
- The annual CSAFE block party in **Cambridge** has grown to include a number of communities outside of the original boundaries.
- Many local churches donate space for the Neighborhood Safety Teams to meet. Examples include **Salisbury Church Street** and **Lexington Park**. In addition, Neighborhood Safety Teams meet in schools, police stations, community centers and town halls.
- The **Harlem Park** HEAT team sponsored a "Seniors Matter" event. Senior citizens and other participants were provided information about legal issues, safety, and fraud alerts for scams targeting seniors.
- The **Crisfield** Elks Club donated funds for an annual fishing trip for community youth.
- A CSAFE basketball team was formed in the **EMBARC** CSAFE area. Uniforms were purchased and games were played at a gym within the area. The CSAFE team has played games against officers from the Baltimore Police Department. The purpose of these games is to attract neighborhood residents and to encourage community interaction after the games.
- Members of the **Yorkway** HEAT team developed a list of street robbery prevention tips. Each member of the team shared these tips with community members to help deter crime.

- Members of the **Church Street** HEAT team noticed an increase in gang related graffiti in the area. Team members contacted landlords to encourage them to clean up the graffiti. Area businesses have donated money to fund future graffiti clean ups.
- The **Berlin** HEAT team hosted a Springtime Community Appreciation event. Several agencies set up displays and handed out Easter baskets to area residents.
- The **Cherry Hill** HEAT team held a community forum that was attended by approximately 300 area residents and neighborhood merchants. Refreshments were served and a raffle was held. As a result of the forum, the community hopes to develop a long-range plan to help area residents.
- Members of the **EMBARC** HEAT team periodically hold offender orientations. Members of the HEAT team meet with as many as 60 offenders and share valuable information intended to help the offenders succeed in a community-based environment.
- The **Brooklyn Heights** HEAT team has a community service center located in a strip mall on Ritchie Highway. The “storefront” helps make the team more accessible to the general public as it is within walking distance for almost everyone in the CSAFE site. This easy accessibility has helped to establish a closer relationship between residents and the police. For example, people frequently drop in and provide information on drug activity and other crimes.

HOUSING/NUISANCE ABATEMENT/ CODE ENFORCEMENT *CSAFE Promising Practices*

- The **Woodmoor** and **Germantown** CSAFE areas have established community advisory boards. These boards meet regularly with HEAT team members to address areas of mutual concern.
- Inmates from the Somerset County Detention Center, in conjunction with the Princess Anne Police Department and the **Princess Anne** HEAT team, recently demolished a building associated with prostitution and drug activity. As a result, the community has become a safer place to live, work and raise families.
- **Brooklyn Heights** HEAT team members and many other teams work with housing representatives such as Housing Authorities and landlord coalitions. The goal is to increase communication to improve public safety in rental properties and enforce rules of public and Section 8 housing.
- Housing representatives from a local rental community provide the names of individuals who have been added to the “Do Not Trespass” list to members of the **Frederick** HEAT team. In Baltimore County, private security agencies from local apartment communities are also following this practice.
- The **Chestertown** HEAT team officer arranged a meeting with an apartment manager to address tenant complaints regarding lease violations. These included excessive occupancy in individual apartments.
- The **Yorkway** HEAT team holds a monthly Landlord/ Neighborhood Safety Team meeting prior to the HEAT team meeting. This allows landlords an opportunity to share information and also reduces transient behavior by offenders.
- The **Riverview** HEAT team conducted a “zoning sweep” to inspect properties in the CSAFE area. As a result, 125 notices were mailed to landlords to announce the date and time for a landlord summit.

- Members of the **Church Street** HEAT team have collaborated with the police department and the zoning department to conduct joint ride-alongs in the community to identify problem properties. Once problems are identified, the participants work together to develop strategies to correct the problems.
- During a recent case presentation, the **Riverview** HEAT team noticed that a new offender used an address that had been the center of numerous neighborhood problems and complaints. The team followed up to ensure that the offender was on the lease at the problem address.
- The **Cambridge** CSAFE team gave presentations to the Bay Country Tenants Association and the Cambridge Housing Authority to establish partnerships with those organizations.

YOUTH

CSAFE Promising Practices

- Residents of the EMBARC community identified local houses to be boarded up in an effort to decrease drug activity and nuisance crimes. The **EMBARC** Heat team identified local youth to create the artwork for the boards.
- The **Taneytown** HEAT team officer participates in “Not My Kid.” This role-play activity at Taneytown Middle School acts out real life scenarios for youth and their parents.
- Through the generosity of local merchants and The Bike Doctor, the **Westlake** HEAT team has been able to work with the Charles County Office of the Sheriff to give bicycles to local youth for Christmas. Community organizations are instrumental in identifying those youth who would benefit from a new bicycle.
- Members of the **Westlake** HEAT team volunteer as chaperones for school and after-school activities that include youth who may be high risk.
- The **Federalsburg** and **Pocomoke City** HEAT teams assist with an annual youth fishing tournament held at local marinas.
- The **Pocomoke City** HEAT team supervised street hockey games for local youth ages 12-18 years.
- The **Deep Creek** HEAT team has an agreement with the Deep Creek Middle School that allows youth to use the school gym for chaperoned after-school activities.
- Children Involved in Neighborhood Improvement (CINI) allows **Chestertown** youth who reside in the CSAFE area to earn \$15.00 per day for attending educational sessions and participating in community improvement activities such as neighborhood clean-ups. Youth must also participate in a short educational component. The local business association donates the funding.

- There are nine assisted living communities within the **Parole** CSAFE area. The HEAT team realized youth in these sites were not exposed to fun activities promoting positive lifestyles. They worked with a group funded by local churches and businesses to introduce youth to sailing and other water activities.
- The **Berlin** HEAT team worked in conjunction with the Health Department to hold a “Safe Kids Day.” This multi-agency event, which was held at the Board of Education, was intended to educate children and parents about how young people can avoid becoming victims of crime.
- The **Pocomoke City** HEAT team held a Christmas party for area youth in 2004. More than 200 young people attended the party. Members of the team helped by wrapping toys and entertaining the children.
- The Baltimore County Police Department has a volunteer who enters information from police juvenile field interview reports into a database. Members of the **Riverview** HEAT team review this database so they can be aware of what juveniles have been stopped by the police and why.
