From the office of the Executive Director

POLICE ENTRANCE LEVEL TRAINING

In 1998, on the strength of a grant from the Department of Justice, Office of Community Policing, the Police and Correctional Training Commissions (PCTC) conducted two entrance level programs for law enforcement officers. The entrance level program was the final component of a project begun in 1996 which consisted of the development and presentation of community policing, problem solving training for law enforcement executives, administrators, supervisors, line officers and civilian personnel. The 720-hour entrance level curriculum consisted of 54 training modules, each of which was infused with the philosophy of community policing and problem solving strategies. The fifty-nine graduates of the two programs represented twenty-seven different law enforcement and correctional agencies. As plans were under way to begin the third session in March 1999, federal funding ran out and the program had to be put on hold.

The Maryland legislature authorized the allocation of funds in the fiscal 2001 budget to enable the Police and Correctional Training Commissions to resume entrance level training for law enforcement officers. The next class is anticipated to begin in October. The revised course will be 760 hours and will include a two-week firearms component emphasizing judgmental shooting as well as skill development. Training will be

highly interactive, stressing the development of problem solving skills and critical thinking. To maximize student interaction, class size will be limited to 25 students assigned to 5 training squads. Tuition will be charged to cover the cost of non-budgeted items, including non-returnable training materials, driver training and firearms facility fees. The anticipated cost per student will be \$1,200.

With the resumption of the program in October, PCTC plans to conduct a minimum of two 760-hour entrance level classes each year. In addition, two comparative compliance classes will be held between the two full entrance level classes. NEW PRIOR USE OF CDS REGULATIONS

Effective July 1, 2000, new regulations took effect governing the prior use of controlled dangerous substances (CDS) by applicants for all police and mandated correctional positions, including individuals seeking recertification, beginning with individuals hired on or after 7/1/00. Police and correctional agencies will need to include the investigation of each applicant's possible prior CDS use as part of the background investigation and interview process.

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NEW REGULATIONS

Both sets of regulations:

1. Set maximum lifetime usage limits on the prior use of certain CDS;
2. Specify the minimum time since the last use (3 years for corrections & 2 years for police);
3. Prohibit certification of an individual who has been involved in (correctional) or found guilty of (police) the sale, manufacture or distribution of CDS;
4. Specify procedures for evaluation of legal use or abuse of prescribed CDS by an applicant; and
5. Make no allowance for the use of certain CDS, including Hallucinogens (PCP, LSD, Mescaline) for corrections and Cocaine, Heroin, PCP or LSD for police.

Each Commission's regulations differ somewhat in the area of the prior use allowance for certain CDS as follows:

1. Police Agencies - except for Cocaine, Heroin, PCP & LSD (all prohibited) and marijuana (20 uses allowed), the regulations will permit an applicant a maximum of three lifetime uses of any other CDS listed in Article 27, §279, of the Annotated Code of Maryland. The applicant may not have used any CDS within the two years prior to application for the position.

2. Correctional Agencies - except for Hallucinogens (prohibited), the Correctional Training Commission set the following limits on lifetime uses of certain CDS including:

- a. Amphetamines, Cocaine, Benzodiazepines and Inhalants (including solvents, glue, paint, aerosols and amyl nitrates) - A maximum of 4 lifetime uses and a minimum of 3 years from the last use before the date of application;
- b. Barbiturates and Opiates - A maximum of 2 lifetime uses and a minimum of 3 years from the last use;
- c. Cannabis (including marijuana) A maximum of 20 lifetime uses and a minimum of 3 years since the last use;
- d. Hallucinogens (including PCP, LSD and Mescaline) - No prior use of these substances is permitted.

These new regulations apply to all applicants hired on or after 7/1/00. Individuals already hired by 6/30/00, but not certified (including those in an academy), do not have to meet these new regulations. In addition, the regulations permit the agency to define what they regard as a "use" of a CDS as long as this definition has a rational basis, is reasonable and uniformly applied by the agency.

Agencies should indicate on the Application For Certification (AFC) that the applicant meets the applicable prior use regulation. On the Police AFC, the "bubble" on page 3 before "Meets Prior Drug Standards" should be filled in. For Corrections, the hiring agency should write in a statement that "The applicant meets all prior use standards" in the area under section 8, page four of the AFC, until a new AFC form is distributed.

NOTES FROM THE CERTIFICATION UNIT

Police Officer Certification Renewal

As of June 9th, the Certification Unit has issued 5,010 certification renewals to law enforcement officers throughout the State. In accordance with Regulation 06, all law enforcement agencies have been notified regarding the officers in their agencies whose authority to enforce the general law of the State may expire at midnight on June 30, 2000 due to failure to meet the Commission's training standards.

Annual Training Records

During February and March, the Certification Unit issued annual training compliance reports to all law enforcement and State and local correctional agencies. These reports provide the agencies with training compliance percentages as well as listing the officers for whom we have a record of less than complete annual training. As a result of these reports, agencies have an opportunity to correct already submitted training data or submit additional training records.

With regard to law enforcement agencies, the quick response to the compliance reports has allowed our staff to correct our training records and, in the case of law enforcement officers whose certifications are due to be renewed, we were able to issue certification cards promptly.

As always, thanks to all agencies for assisting us in maintaining complete and accurate records for your mandated personnel.

Application for Certification Form

All law enforcement and correctional agencies are required to submit an Application for Certification (AFC) form for individuals employed in mandated positions who are required, by law, to be certified. An officer's certification is the authority to carry out the duties and responsibilities of the mandated position.

The information contained on the AFC form is based on the documents an agency has compiled while completing the background and criminal investigation as required by each Commission's mandated selection standards. The AFC forms **must be complete** in order for the staff to process the individual for certification. Unfortunately, we frequently receive incomplete AFC forms which must be returned to the agency, thereby, delaying the officer's certification.

Many times the incomplete information is

simply an oversight on the part of the preparer. Since an officer cannot legally perform the duties of the mandated position until certification has been issued, delays in the certification process can be avoided by carefully proof-reading the AFC before submitting it to our office.

Notice of Personnel Action Form

The Regulations of both Commissions require agencies to report changes in the employment status of mandated employees. Frequently we receive the Notice of Personnel Action forms with incomplete information.

These forms must be returned for complete information, thereby delaying the entry of updated employment changes for the officer. Again, proof-reading the form prior to submission is suggested.

LEGAL CORNER

New Maryland decisions:

Search & Seizure - Warrant - Vehicle Moved to Another Jurisdiction

Prince George's County police arrested Antwaun Brown for the murder of an off-duty D.C. police officer. After arresting Brown, officers sought to obtain a search warrant for his car, which was parked in front of his home. When officers returned to execute the warrant, the car was gone, and Brown's mother gave police an address in D.C. where it could be found. The Prince George's County officers found the car in D.C., and had it towed back to their evidence bay. A search of the car turned up the gun used in the shooting. Brown argued that the gun should have been suppressed because the Prince George's County officers became private citizens once they crossed into D.C., and the Maryland search warrant did not give them authority to go into D.C. to execute the warrant.

The Court of Special Appeals upheld the use of evidence found in the car, held that the officers were not acting as private citizens when they towed the car from D.C. to Maryland, and held that the protections of the 4th Amendment did apply. The Court found that sufficient exigency in these circumstances - particularly due to the fact that someone besides Brown moved the car that the officers had a warrant to search - to justify the officers' actions. The Court did not approve of the officers' failure to ask D.C. police for help, but said that to do so would have taken substantial time and may have been at the expense of key evidence. The fact that they left Maryland did not negate probable cause to search the car. *Brown v. State*, 2000 WL 694739 (5/31/00).

Search & Seizure - Terry Stop - Flight from Police in High Crime Area

A Baltimore City plainclothes detective in an unmarked car observed Marvin Wise walk into an alley in a neighborhood known for its drug dealing, and saw him ball up a brown paper bag and place it under a telephone book in a grassy area in the alley. The officer said Wise made eye contact with him - after which his "eyes widened" - took a few steps backward, and then began to run when the officer got out of his vehicle. Wise was intercepted and cuffed. The bag was found to contain cocaine and he was arrested, and then police found \$40 in \$1s and \$5s on his person. His motion to suppress the money was denied.

Applying *Illinois v. Wardlow*, __U.S.__, 120 S.Ct. 673 (2000) (See Training Notes, March-April 2000), the Court upheld the denial of Wise's motion to suppress. The U.S. Supreme Court recently removed any doubt

as to whether the suspect's flight, under these circumstances, justified the police chase and the subsequent detention and search. By balling up the paper bag and placing it under a phone book, then reacting with a look that indicated his flight was a reaction to police, Wise created a situation that entitled police to stop and detain him briefly. The immediate discovery of the bag and the evidence gave police probable cause to arrest, and the \$40 was properly discovered in his pocket during a search incident to arrest. *Wise v. State*, 2000 WL 528067 (5/3/00).

Search & Seizure - Terry Stop and Frisk

Baltimore City Police received a report of an attempted armed robbery of a 70-year-old couple, and the victims gave detailed descriptions of the assailant and his clothing. About 2 ½ hours later in the same area - where there had been a string of similar robberies - an officer who had received the report saw Michael Sullivan, whose appearance and clothing matched the description. When Sullivan saw the officer, he walked briskly away. When the officer ordered him to stop, Sullivan was holding his hands behind his back. The officer told him to place his hands in front, and Sullivan's jacket raised up to reveal a carpenter's knife in his rear pocket. Before frisking him, the officer ordered him to lie on the ground, and handcuffed him. After frisking him, the officer helped him up and then felt a large bulge resembling a handgun protruding from the armpit down the sleeve. The officer seized the gun, a large BB pistol that eventually linked Sullivan to the attempted robbery. He was convicted, but argued that the gun should have been suppressed because it was discovered after the Terry stop and frisk ended.

Both the trial and appellate court held there was enough reasonable, articulable suspicion for the officer to both stop and frisk Sullivan, and that it did not make a difference that the officer discovered inadvertently what he should have discovered inadvertently several seconds earlier. The officer acted reasonably under the circumstances of a brief but continuous street encounter, and was "not required smartly to turn square corners or to call out his coordinates as he arguably steps from one doctrinal box into another." *Sullivan v. State*, 2000 WL 739280 (6/9/00).

Search & Seizure - vehicle stops

In January 1999, a MD State Police sergeant assigned primarily to drug interdiction observed 3 vehicles traveling closely together on southbound Route 13 in Wicomico County. He believed that the 2nd and 3rd vehicles were following too closely to the vehicles in front for the foggy and rainy conditions, so he called for assistance and then stopped the vehicles.

Another officer approached the 3rd car, and gave the driver a written warning and released him within minutes.

The sergeant approached the 2nd vehicle, a blue Nissan Maxima driven by Kendrick Charity, and asked for his license and registration. He asked for the passenger's documents as well, after noticing the passenger was not wearing a seat belt. At some point, Charity apologized for following too closely. The sergeant noticed a large bundle of air fresheners hanging from the rear view mirror - a later count revealed 72. The sergeant suspected illegal drug activity, based on the large number of air fresheners, and the fact that Charity had a North Carolina license and his passenger had a New York license. He asked Charity to step out and move to the rear of the car, and began questioning him about where he was coming from and going to. Leaving Charity standing in the rain, the sergeant approached the passenger and asked him the same questions. He got different answers, and then went back to Charity.

Because it began to rain heavier, and because he wanted Charity seated in his cruiser, the sergeant asked Charity to submit to a consensual patdown. Charity consented, and after the sergeant felt a bulge in one of his pockets, Charity pulled out a pack of gum and some money. The sergeant also saw a 1-gram size packet in Charity's hand of what looked like marijuana, and then told Charity that he now could do a full-blown search of the car. The passenger was ordered out of the car, and 194 grams of cocaine was found in the car's trunk. Charity was not given a warning or ticket on the following-too-closely violation until several hours later at the police station. Charity's motion to suppress the cocaine was denied, he was convicted of several drug charges, and he appealed the suppression issue.

The Court of Special Appeals reversed, and held that the cocaine should have been suppressed because the car search was a violation of the 4th Amendment. The initial stop for a traffic violation was legitimate under *Whren v. U.S.*, 571 U.S. 806, 116 S.Ct. 1769 (1996), regardless of the sergeant's intentions. But the Court cautioned that "officers should be careful not to attempt to 'push out the envelope' too far, for if the perception should ever arise that 'Whren stops' are being regularly and immoderately abused, courts may be sorely tempted to withdraw the weapon from the law enforcement arsenal."

The Court relied heavily on *Ferris v. State*, 355 Md. 356, 735 A.2d 491 (1999) (see Training Notes, September-October 1999), and said that the problem here was the sergeant abandoning the initial reason for the stop (traffic violation), and pursuing his investigation of suspected drug activity without having sufficient articulable facts to justify it. There is no absolute rule

on how long a traffic stop can last before it violates the 4th Amendment, and the reasonableness of car stops must be decided case-by-case. In this case, once the sergeant told Charity why he was stopped and examined his license and registration, and Charity acknowledged the infraction, any further detention to engage in a drug investigation was beyond the scope of what was permitted in a *Whren* stop. The sergeant may have had a strong hunch that there was drug-related activity afoot, but his knowledge as he stood at the driver-side window and saw the air fresheners did not justify even a Terry patdown. Because Charity was unconstitutionally detained when the sergeant asked him to consent to a pat-down, Charity's "consent" was not voluntary, and was the "fruit of the poisonous tree." *Charity v. State*, 2000 WL 739271 (6/8/00).

Update: domestic violence - police officer's duty to victims

Several months ago, the Maryland Court of Special Appeals held that the domestic violence standby law, Article 27, §798, did not create a special relationship between officers responding to calls for assistance and domestic violence victims, and that officers responding to calls for assistance did not lose immunity. The Court affirmed the grant of summary judgment in favor of the officer, police department, and the city. *Williams v. Mayor, City Council of Baltimore*, 128 Md.App.1, 736 A.2d 1084 (1999) (See Training Notes, March-April 2000). In this case, a victim of domestic violence and her mother called Baltimore City Police for assistance after her physically abusive boyfriend beat and threatened to kill her. An officer responded, took statements, and sent for a unit to go to the boyfriend's suspected location. When the officer went to retrieve a camera to photograph the victim's injuries, the boyfriend stormed into the house, shooting the victim's mother, and fatally shooting the victim and himself. The victim's mother sued the officer, police department, and the city, and the Court's ruling last year had put her out of court.

The victim's mother appealed only the ruling as to the officer. On June 8, 2000, Maryland's highest court issued a decision. The Court made it clear that neither Article 27, §798 nor the Baltimore Police Department's general order #10-93 (requiring officers to protect domestic violence victims) require officers to give victims round-the-clock protection. Instead, §798 and #10-93 require officers to protect victims only from violence occurring in the officer's presence, so that claims against the officer in this case - which are based on §798 and #10-93 - cannot survive. The Court said there is a question about whether the officer's actions toward the victim and her mother created a "special relationship" and a special duty to protect them, and a question of fact about the exchange between the officer and the victim's mother just before the shooting, so the Court sent the case back to the trial court.

General Cultural Diversity in Corrections

The purpose of this video and training guide is to make Corrections staff aware of the importance of cultural diversity in the Correctional workplace. Being aware of cultural diversity issues and showing respect for every person's background or culture will make the correctional facility operate in a more efficient manner. And we're talking about staff as well as inmates.

Corrections, more than ever, is a people business. Staff and inmates must interact with each other every day in a way that insures that the institution is run in a secure and orderly fashion. This can only occur if there is a certain level of respect being shown for everyone's background and cultural issues. Otherwise, serious problems can arise that can interfere with the smooth operation of the facility or in a worst case scenario could cause a riot.

There are people of all races and nationalities inside our correctional facilities and staff have to keep in mind that there are different needs that go along with each culture. Muslims, for instance, cannot eat pork so this must be taken into consideration when planning meals. Other cultures have different dietary and religious needs. Staff should keep their minds open to people of different backgrounds. Being insensitive only promotes distrust, misunderstanding and contempt. And that's not good in a correctional facility. Staff who are open to learning about different cultures can expand their knowledge and that can help them in the performance of their job. Showing an interest in another person's culture shows that you respect them and this helps to promote harmony and an atmosphere of respect throughout the institution. This includes not only everyday dealings with the inmates, but interacting with fellow staff as well. Not only have the inmates become more diversified in Corrections, but staff has too. People from all different backgrounds and cultures now work in our correctional facilities everywhere and it is a trend that will only increase.
