LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Legislative Update

Two bills passed during the recent session of the General Assembly will have major impact on the Maryland Police and Correctional Training Commissions.

Juvenile Justice

House Bill 1414, "Correctional Services - Juvenile Justice" seeks to improve the performance of Juvenile Justice personnel by requiring the Correctional Training Commission to develop and implement a specific program design and appropriate course curriculum and training for Department of Juvenile Justice employees. It also requires the Commission to establish minimum qualifications for probationary or permanent appointment as a Department employee, and alters the membership and appointment of speci-

fied members of the Commission. In addition, "Department of Juvenile Justice employee" has been defined to include employees of any non-profit or for-profit entity under contract with the Department of Juvenile Justice whose employment responsibility is the investigation, custody, control, or supervision of minors, juvenile delinquents, and youthful offenders who are committed, detained, awaiting placement, adjudicated delinquent, or are otherwise under supervision of the Department.

Gun Safety

The "Responsible Gun Safety Act of 2000" (Senate Bill 211) mandates that persons applying to purchase a handgun on or after January 1, 2002 will have completed a certified Firearms Safety Training Course conducted free of charge by the Maryland Police Training Commission or that meets the standards established by the Commission. These courses will be no more than two hours in length and conducted at least every week in all geographic areas of the state after regular business hours. The courses must contain a handgun safety component and be conducted by an individual or organization certified by: the Maryland Police Training Commission, Department of Natural Resources Police, Maryland State Police or a reputable organization whose course has been determined by the Commission to meet the regulations adopted by the Commission.

USE OF FORCE IN CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES

Is Report Writing the Foundation of a Successful Defense?

Inmate lawsuits are an unfortunate fact of life for correctional facilities. Paraphrasing the August 1999 issue of *The AG's Docket*, the quarterly report from the Attorney General's Correctional Litigation Division, we give the following advice to correctional officers: you can limit your exposure and assist in the defense of an inmate suit by keeping excellent written records. An "excellent" record in this context is one that is clear, concise, and thorough. Remember, what is clear to you may not be clear to lay persons, including jurors and judges who may later read the report.

The value of this advice cannot be overstated. Not only must incident and use of force reports be prepared in accordance with departmental rules and regulations, such reports should be written clearly and completely, as they may become central to the defense of any lawsuit alleging the use of excessive force by a correctional officer. The following items should be included in any report concerning the use of force against an inmate:

- A description of the disturbance or altercation which resulted in the use of force;
- A complete description of the force used by correctional officers, including any weapons or restraining devices, etc., used;
- Why force was used;
- The departmental rule(s)/regulation(s) authorizing the use of force;
- Description of injury, if any, sustained by the inmate, or any complaint of injury by the inmate;
- Whether medical personnel responded, or the inmate was taken to the medical unit;
- Whether the inmate requested medical attention;
- Whether the correctional officer was injured and, if so, a description of the injury(ies);
- Whether the incident was videotaped or the inmate was photographed after the occurrence.

While such attention to detail cannot prevent lawsuits, it can go a long way towards a successful defense. If reports are not written effectively or fail to include the information listed above, they, and the officers who wrote them, become the targets of plaintiffs and their attorneys. You get only one chance to write the report concerning use of force; make sure you protect yourself by doing it well.

Searches & Seizures

**"Squeezing" Luggage
of Bus Passengers - Illegal Search**

Border Patrol Agent Cantu boarded a bus in Texas to do a routine check of passengers' immigration status. As he walked off the bus, he squeezed the soft luggage in the overhead storage space. When he squeezed a canvas bag above Bond's seat, he noticed it contained a brick-like object. Bond admitted owning the bag and consented to its search. Agent Cantu discovered a brick of methamphetamine inside, and Bond was indicted on federal drug charges. Bond moved to suppress the methamphetamine, alleging the search violated his 4th Amendment rights.

The suppression issue reached the U.S. Supreme Court, which held that Agent Cantu's physical manipulation of the carry-on bag violated the 4th Amendment's prohibition against unreasonable searches. A traveler's personal luggage is clearly protected by the 4th Amendment, and Bond had an undisputed privacy interest in the bag, even though it was in the storage space above him.

Under the 4th Amendment analysis, there are 2 questions to answer. (1) Does a person try, by his conduct, to preserve something as private? Bond did just that by using a non-transparent bag and placing it directly above his seat. (2) Is a person's expectation of privacy recognized by society as reasonable? Although bus passengers clearly expect their bags to be exposed to the public, and that other passengers/bus employees may handle their bags, they do not expect their bags will be squeezed in an exploratory manner. *Bond v. United States, 2000 WL 381264 (April 17, 2000).*

LEGAL CORNER

Correctional Facilities - Americans with Disabilities Act - Applicability to Prisons, *Amos, et al. v. Md. DPSCS, et al.*, Civil No. JFM-91-508. This case spanned nearly a decade, and centered on the civil rights of physically impaired inmates who were mainly housed at Roxbury Correctional Institution (RCI). At the time the 13 disabled inmates were sent to RCI, it was a new facility set on flat ground, making it easier for those with ambulation problems to get around. Warden Jon Galley was proactive in assessing the needs of the inmates, consulting with disabilities' groups, including Montebello State Hospital, Maryland Citizens for Housing the Disabled, the Western Maryland Coalition for the Disabled. Numerous accommodations were made for the disabled prisoners before suit was filed. Indeed, prior to the suit, Warden Galley had received no complaints from plaintiff-inmates about accommodations.

The suit was premised on an alleged denial of rights under the federal Rehabilitation Act, the 8th Amendment (as to health care) and, eventually, the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). The law was wholly unsettled as to the ADA, and unclear regarding prisons as to the Rehabilitation Act, and the case was very resource-intensive. The federal court appointed the ACLU to represent the inmates, and it received enormous assistance from Crowell & Moring of Washington, DC, which at one time committed 14 lawyers' help. The Maryland Attorney General represented the State defendants.

The Attorney General's office recommended that settlement on favorable terms be considered after the first few years of the suit, when it became evident that the law was in a state of flux and the case would not be soon resolved. After about a year's negotiation, no settlement could be reached, primarily because the amount of attorneys' fees and damages could not be agreed. Meanwhile, experts toured RCI, making recommendations on how to make the institution better accessible - most of those recommendations were followed. Having made changes became critical, because the disabled inmates were also seeking injunctive relief (physical changes to RCI). So the State was able to show the federal court that injunctive relief was not necessary.

The law was also evolving, as different aspects of the ADA were tested in the federal courts. In 1996, the federal district court dismissed the case against the State as to the Rehabilitation Act and ADA claims and granted the State summary judgement on the 8th Amendment/health care issues. On the first appeal to the 4th Circuit, the State prevailed. The ACLU petitioned for review by the Supreme Court, which subsequently held in a similar case that the ADA *does* apply to State prisons. When the case returned to the 4th Circuit, that court asked the parties to address and brief issues about certain aspects of the ADA's constitutionality. The State maintained that the ADA is constitutional, as long as it provides no greater rights than those protected by the 14th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. The Court also heard from disability advocacy groups, the U.S. Department of Justice, and the Association of State Correctional Administrators, which argued that the ADA is unconstitutional as applied to State prisons.

The 4th Circuit then held that the ADA is constitutional, and that federal ADA regulations about accessibility (height of toilets, width of cell doors, etc.) should be given great deference. Because this position is contrary to case law about how federal courts should not interfere in the management of State prisons, the State filed a petition in the summer of 1999 for the *en banc* (full) 4th Circuit court to hear the matter. In late August 1999, the parties resumed attempts to settle the case to try to avoid perpetual litigation.

On December 28, 1999, the 4th Circuit granted a rehearing *en banc*, which occurs only in extraordinary circumstances - this itself was a victory for the State because it wiped out the earlier, less favorable opinion. And, the Supreme Court decided to hear 2 cases about the constitutionality of the ADA. Negotiations to settle heated up as the parties filed more briefs and the February 29, 2000 argument approached.

The ACLU claimed that it spent over \$1,300,000.00 in attorneys' fees on this case, and the inmates wanted from \$25,000 to \$65,000 each. No matter what the 4th Circuit did with the ADA claim, the decision would be still subject to review by the Supreme Court. And there were still completely unresolved questions about how to construe the Rehabilitation Act. The litigation could continue for many years. Under these circumstances, the Attorney General's Office recommended and negotiated a settlement of the entire case—including attorneys' fees, damages for each of the inmates and injunctive relief—of \$200,000.00 and a hospital bed for one of the inmates.

LEGAL CORNER

The two other ADA cases before the Supreme Court also settled, but the Supreme Court has a chance to review the ADA's constitutionality shortly, and will probably do so.

Search & Seizure - Reliability of Anonymous Tip - Basis for Terry Stop

After an anonymous caller reported to the Miami-Dade Police that a young black male standing at a particular bus stop and wearing a plaid shirt was carrying a gun, officers went to the bus stop and saw 3 black males, one of whom (J.L., a minor) was wearing a plaid shirt. Apart from the tip, the officers had no reason to suspect any of the 3 males of illegal conduct - they saw no firearm and saw no unusual movements. The officers frisked J.L., seized a gun from his pocket, and charged him with firearms violations. The trial court granted J.L.'s motion to suppress the gun as the fruit of an unlawful search, and the suppression issue ultimately reached the U.S. Supreme Court.

The Court held that an anonymous tip that a person is carrying a gun, without more information, is not enough to justify a police officer's stop and frisk of that person. In *Terry v. Ohio*, the Court held that an officer, for the protection of himself and others, may conduct a very limited search for weapons in the outer clothing of persons engaged in unusual conduct, where the officer reasonably concludes - in light of his experience and what he observes - that criminal activity may be afoot and the person may be armed and dangerous.

The Court refused to extend *Terry* to justify J.L.'s search because the basis for the search was unreliable. The officers' suspicions arose *solely* from a call made from an unknown location by an unknown caller, not from officers' own observations. Generally, anonymous tips are less reliable than tips from known sources, whose reputation can be assessed and who can be held responsible if the allegations turn out to be false. Anonymous tips can form the basis for reasonable suspicion only if they come with specific information to indicate reliability (e.g., correctly forecasting the subject's movements, how they know about the illegal activity - not just identifying a person). The fact that the gun allegation turned out to be correct does not justify the search. The Court specifically refused to adopt a 'firearm exception' to *Terry* that would allow tips about illegal guns to justify a stop and frisk. This would let anyone harass another person simply by anonymously calling the police, and it would be difficult to limit it just to firearms, and would unaccept-

ably risk exposing the public to intrusive searches.

The Court was careful to point out that this ruling does *not* pertain to situations where anonymous tips allege such great danger that a search may be justified even if the tip seems unreliable (report of person carrying a bomb), or the right of public officials to conduct protective searches in places with a lower privacy interest (airports, schools). *Florida v. J.L.* (2000 WL 309131, 3/28/00).

Searches & Seizures - Motorist Checkpoints

The U.S. Supreme Court has agreed to review a federal court ruling in the 7th Circuit that says routine drug-stop checkpoints, where most motorists are detained for about 3 minutes, are unreasonable and unlawful seizures. A decision should be issued in the next few months. *Indianapolis v. Edmond*, 183 F.3d 659 (7th Cir.1999), *cert. granted*, 120 S.Ct. 1156 (2/22/00).

Criminal Law - Robbery - Deadly Weapon

The highest court in Maryland has ruled that the spraying of pepper spray or mace into a person's face for the purpose of facilitating the robbery of that person is - as a matter of law - the use of a "dangerous and deadly weapon" in the commission of robbery for purposes of the robbery with deadly weapon statute, MD Code, Article 27, §488. *Handy v. State*, 2000 WL 150808 (Md. Court of Appeals, 2/14/00).

Searches & Seizures - "Trash Runs"

Warrantless "trash runs" violated defendant's 4th Amendment protection against unreasonable government intrusion, where police reached into her yard to remove trash bags she had placed out for trash collection, and evidence found in the bags led to her conviction on CDS charges. The trash bags were considered to be within the curtilage of the home because they were leaning against a tree in defendant's yard. "Although a resident who places a trash bag out for collection has no Fourth Amendment protection against the trash collector picking up the bag and turning it over to the police, the Fourth Amendment does prohibit a law enforcement officer from making a warrantless seizure of a trash bag located within the curtilage of the residence." *Sampson v. State*, 2000 WL 36233 (Md. Court of Special Appeals 1/19/00).
