2nd Annual Trainers' Conference

Striving for Excellence: Technology in Training

On October 29, 2002, the Maryland Police and Correctional Training Commissions (MPCTC) presented the 2nd Annual Trainers' Conference at the La Fontaine Bleu ballroom in Glen Burnie, MD. The theme of this year's conference was Technology in Training and it was primarily targeted at professional criminal justice trainers, here in Maryland and in the surrounding region. Co-sponsors with the MPCTC were the Maryland Chiefs of Police Association and the Maryland State Use Industries.

The use of technology is an exciting and challenging aspect in professional training, especially in law enforcement and corrections applications. Distance, or on-line learning brings the student and trainer into the virtual classroom with the broadcast of a training unit to distant locations, usually through video presentations, by way of a local area network (LAN). The myriad adult learning opportunities offered by Internet technology include web-based and computer-based

learning via a personal computer that enables the student to progress through a course of study with an electronic workbook in which the student can learn and practice skills on-line, in effect, a network-enabled transfer of skills and knowledge.

The conference began at 7:30 AM sharp, with registration followed by a continental breakfast. Mr. Lee Goldman, the MPCTC Administrator, Police Training Programs, was the conference moderator and he opened the session and introduced the guest speakers, which included Donald G. Hopkins, the MPCTC Executive Director and Patrick L. Bradley, the MPCTC Deputy Director. Mr. Hopkins offered the Introductory Address and Mr. Bradley conducted the Recognition Ceremony. The keynote speaker was Mr. Jim Hemgen of ITECH Services in Frederick, MD.

The conference agenda consisted of three Workshop tracks and attendees could choose topics that were most interesting to them.

Track One included sessions on Academic Credentialing which was presented by Lt. Alison Chapman of the Frederick County Sheriff's Office; Technology in the Classroom, presented by Mr. Greg Stefanelli of Carroll County Community College; and a two-part presentation by Mr. Jack Harne from the National Law Enforcement Technology Center, titled: The Internet as an Educational Tool.

Track Two consisted of sessions on MPCTC: Myths and Misconceptions, presented by Ms. Christine Melville, MPCTC Certification Officer; Developing Tabletop Exercises, a presentation by Mr. John Reintzell of Leadership Training Associates; Improving Classroom Presentations, presented by Captain Stan Malm, of the Annapolis Police Department; and a session titled: Games and Ice Breakers.

NOTES FROM THE CERTIFICATION UNIT

Police Officer/Correctional Certification

All agencies are reminded not to take for granted that because your agency has submitted an Application For Certification (AFC) form to the Commissions' office that your mandated employee is certified. The Certification Unit continues to receive incomplete AFC forms from law enforcement and correctional agencies that must be returned for corrected or additional information, thereby, delaying the certification process.

Law enforcement officers will be issued a certification card which will identify the officer by name and employing agency, and contain a certification expiration date. Correctional agencies will receive a copy of Page One of the AFC form which shows a date of certification in the lower right hand corner. Until your agency receives either the certification card or the copy of Page One of the AFC (for correctional personnel), do not assume that the officer is certified.

Your agency is invited to contact the Certification Unit at (410) 750-6529 or 6530 if you have any questions regarding the certification status of an officer.

Annual Training Records

By regulation, all annual in-service and firearms qualification scores are due by January 31st. However, we encourage all agencies to forward the information as soon as your training is completed for the year. This allows us more time to input and review the information and get back to you on any problems or missing information. Both Commissions have placed a much greater emphasis on compliance with annual training requirements which requires us to report compliance levels to each Commission as soon as possible.

To ensure that your reporting goes smoothly, the Certification Unit encourages all law enforcement and correctional agencies to: (1) review their 2002 annual training records to ensure that all officers required annual in-service training and firearms qualification have completed their training; (2) review all data for completeness and accuracy before submitting it to the Commissions in order to minimize errors. Quite often, a simple key stroking error, or the omission of data, will place an officer on a non-compliance report or delay the certification renewal of an officer; (3) make sure that your agency has reported changes in employment status of officers (i.e. termination, promotion or non-officer status) using the Notice of Personnel Action (NPA) form; and (4) check that all annual training programs are currently approved.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT FUND

WORKLOAD ANALYSIS AND RESOURCE ALLOCATION

The next program is scheduled for December 2002 in Baltimore. Registration notices have been mailed.

L.E.O.B.R. (LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER'S BILL OF RIGHTS)

Staff is in the process of scheduling another program. When plans are finalized notices will be mailed out.

MANAGING THE MARGINAL EMPLOYEE

Reviews for the first program were excellent and as a result four (4) additional sessions are being planned for 2003. See the Institute's 2002-2003 schedule.

INSIGHT INTO CORRECTIONAL CULTURE: SITUATIONAL LEADERSHIP

Funding for this program was exhausted in September 2002. Approximately 180 individuals were trained during this funding cycle at no cost to their

agencies. The program received very good reviews from the participants. The program is designed to enhance the responsiveness of supervisors and administrators to important issues in correctional culture to include situational leadership. This program gives individuals new tools to confront and solve problems relating to such issues as Cross Gender Supervision, Mentally Ill Offenders, Sexual Misconduct and Gangs.

The Maryland Correctional Administrators Association has approved match funds for a second grant request. If funded by the Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention, additional programs will be scheduled.

QUARTERLY TRAININGS

Staff, in conjunction with the Maryland Correctional Administrators Association's Training Committee held its first quarterly training session on September 12, 2002 at the Ramada at BWI and the topic "Leading with Integrity", was presented by Dr. Albert Pierce, Director of the Center for the Study of Professional Military Ethics at the U. S. Naval Academy. The program received excellent evaluations from the 45 individuals who attended the session. Additional quarterly training sessions are in the works with the next program tentatively set for March 2003.

Staff is also working in conjunction with the Maryland Chiefs of Police Association's Training Committee. The session scheduled on Hate Crimes and other Internet issues to be held on September 26, 2002 was postponed and to date, it has not been rescheduled.

DIGEST OF CRIMINAL LAWS

There was an error found on page 3 of the Digest of Criminal Laws. The words on page 3 should read as follows:

THE FOLLOWING REPRESENTS AREAS OF CHANGE IN THE 2002 EDITION OF THE DIGEST OF CRIMINAL LAWS:

The majority of Article 27 was re-written and is now found in the Criminal Law Article. The actual changes are too numerous to list. For the most part, the content was not changed substantially but was merely reorganized by the legislature.

Please ensure all your officers are aware of this change.

LEGAL CORNER

Alcohol-related driving offenses - reasonable force to obtain blood or breath sample

Maryland's Compulsory Testing Law (Transportation Art., §16-205.1(c)) provides that if a person is involved in a motor vehicle accident resulting in death or life-threatening injury to another person, and police have reasonable grounds to believe the person was driving while impaired by drugs or alcohol, "the person shall be required to submit to a test [of breath or blood to determine alcohol/CDS content], as directed by the officer." The Maryland Attorney General interpreted this section to mean that, because this law makes testing compulsory, law enforcement officers may use force if necessary to effect testing. However, any force used must be reasonable. If police initiate physical violence while administering the test, refuse to consider alternative testing procedures, or respond to resistance with inappropriate force, there may be a constitutional violation. 87 *Opinions of the Attorney General* __ (2002) [No. 02-014 (Sept. 12, 2002)].

Warrantless arrest for misdemeanor - reasonable promptness

Under Maryland law, police may arrest without a warrant a person who commits, or attempts to commit, a felony or misdemeanor in the presence or view of the officer. Criminal Procedure Art., §2-202(a), (b). That warrantless arrest must be made within a reasonable time after the commission of the offense. Where police observed Torres commit trespass, and arrested him for it without a warrant 13 days later, the Court of Special Appeals held that police did not act with "reasonable promptness" in making the warrantless arrest. *Torres v. State*, 2001 WL 34005340 (Sept. 12, 2002).

4th Amendment - traffic stop - reasonable suspicion - cracked windshield

Police observed Muse driving a car with a crack in the middle of windshield, and stopped him to issue an equipment repair order. But Muse could not produce a license or registration, and an MVA record check revealed his license was suspended and he had a district court FTA. Police then arrested Muse, and a search incident to arrest yielded 2 vials of powder in his shirt pocket. A body cavity search at the station yielded 24 small bags of a chunky white substance, all of which was confirmed to be 4.5 grams of cocaine.

Muse challenged the traffic stop, arguing the cracked windshield did not give police reasonable suspicion to believe he was driving with unsafe or improper equipment. Treating the case as one of first impression, the Court of Special Appeals held that police had a reasonable basis to stop Muse in order to investigate the damaged windshield. The Maryland Transportation Article prohibits driving "with improper equipment... that is in such unsafe condition as to endanger any person...." §22-101. Having observed the cracked windshield, police could reasonably be concerned the crack made the vehicle "unsafe," and sighting this condition compelled further investigation. *Muse v. State*, 2002 WL 31007484 (Sept. 9, 2002).

4th Amendment - traffic stop - detention - search of van's ceiling

Driver Nathan and passenger Shaw challenged the stop, detention, and search of their van, which yielded 4.8 kg of cocaine, and 193 grams of pure heroin hidden in the van's altered ceiling compartment. The Court of Appeals upheld the stop and search of the van, and Nathan's and Shaw's convictions on drug charges, and held:

- Initial stop. Maryland State Police Sgt. Mike Lewis observed a 1988 van driving past his unmarked cruiser at a high rate of speed, then pursued and paced it at about 70 mph (in a 60 mph zone). Lewis observed the vehicle drift across the shoulder twice, and saw the left brake lamp was out. Based on these facts, the initial traffic stop was valid.
- Police conduct during the stop. While stopping the van, Lewis noticed passenger Shaw in the rear raising and lowering his head. When driver Nathan rolled down the window, Lewis noted an overwhelming air freshener odor, and noticed a conversion ceiling in the van's roof that was lower than normal, with extremely tight fabric that did not appear to match the age of the van. He saw Shaw lying beneath some travel bags and a blanket, pretending to be asleep. Shaw produced ID and registration of the van in his name; Nathan could not produce any ID. While talking with Lewis, both men showed extreme nervousness, and gave evasive and inconsistent answers about their travel itinerary and purpose.

All of these factors together justified enough reasonable suspicion for a continued investigative detention.

- Basis for searching the van & ceiling compartment. After interviewing the men and noting the above, Lewis asked Shaw if he could take a quick look around the van for drugs and guns; Shaw consented. Lewis knocked on the lowered ceiling, and then believed it was not the original ceiling and instead a smuggling compartment. Lewis tried several methods of gaining access to the ceiling compartment, and then finally tore open the ceiling, where he found the drugs. The Court noted that the significance of a vehicle alteration or hidden compartment was an issue of first impression, and that every other court that has considered the issue has concluded that such evidence can contribute to a finding of probable cause to search. The Court avoided deciding the issue of whether a false ceiling alone would be enough probable cause. Based on all the factors combined, the Court held that by the time Lewis began tearing into the van's ceiling, he had probable cause to believe the van contained contraband, and was therefore justified in making the warrantless search. *Nathan v. State, State v. Shaw*, 2002 WL 1987658 (Aug. 29, 2002).

No-knock warrants - review by suppression court - officer's good faith reliance

Neither a suppression hearing judge nor an appellate court is authorized to make a decision about whether a no-knock warrant was necessary. This decision is only for the judge who signs the warrant, and must be given great deference if there is some "substantial basis" to support the issuing judge's conclusion. The Court of Special Appeals found there was a "substantial basis" for the judge to issue a no-knock warrant on these facts: a confidential informant reported being in the subject apartment 3 times and seeing substantial commercial drug activity; and the rap sheet of 1 of the suspects linked to the apartment included 12 arrests, 6 for possession of a handgun, 4 for assault or battery, along with abduction and resisting arrest charges. It is preferable for police to get a warrant before entering a home, and to allow courts to 2nd-guess warrants may discourage police from seeking them. Further, even if the warrant judge did not have "substantial basis" for issuing the no-knock warrant, the police were entitled to their good faith reliance on it. *State v. Riley*, 2002 WL 31040205 (Sept. 13, 2002).

Terry stop - field interview - consent to search

Police received an anonymous tip that a man (Graham) was dealing drugs out of a gray Ford, that he could be found leaning against the Ford in a certain block of Baltimore City, and the tip gave a physical description of the man. An officer responded, and what he saw matched the tip. The officer asked Graham a few questions, and then asked if he could search him for weapons. Graham did not object, the officer patted him down but discovered only keys. The officer asked who owned the car and if the keys would fit. Graham said the car wasn't his and the keys wouldn't fit, but handed the keys to the officer when he asked if he could try the Ford door. The keys fit, and when the officer opened the door, he saw a large amount of cash on the floorboard, and opened the trunk finding 67 vials of cocaine. Graham was arrested on CDS charges.

Graham moved to suppress the drugs, arguing the encounter violated the 4th Amendment. The trial court held that the drugs were found pursuant to a proper Terry stop and frisk, and denied the motion to suppress. The Court of Special Appeals reversed, cautioning police against conducting 'field interviews' that automatically include a frisk for weapons. Accosting Graham and asking him a few questions was fine, but frisking for weapons implicated the 4th Amendment, which meant police had to have either reasonable articulable suspicion (RAS) of criminal activity, or Graham's consent. The state conceded that there was no RAS, but argued the encounter was consensual because Graham did not object to the frisk, and indeed handed the officer the car keys. But the Court held there was no consent, and that Graham's 'failure expressly to object or the failure physically to resist may be indicative only of acquiescence and not necessarily of voluntary consent.' The Court noted that, even if Graham had consented to a search, that consent was procured during an illegal detention and would have been invalid. *Graham v. State*, 2002 WL 31000831 (Sept. 6, 2002).

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LEGAL CORNER

Probable cause - arrest - proof of passenger's possession of CDS found in car

Pringle was a passenger in the front seat of a car stopped by police for speeding and seat belt violation; another passenger rode in the back. After police issued the driver an oral warning, they asked for and received the driver's consent to search the car. Police asked the men out of the car, frisked them, and seated them on the curb. Police recovered a large amount of cash from the glove box and 5 plastic baggies of cocaine from the backseat armrest.

Police told them unless someone confessed, they would all be arrested. Nobody confessed at the scene, and all 3 were arrested. About 2 hours later, police gave Pringle his *Miranda* rights and interviewed him; Pringle gave a written confession that the drugs were his. At trial, Pringle tried to suppress the confession, but the motion was denied, and he was convicted of CDS offenses. The Court of Special Appeals upheld the conviction. *Pringle v. State*, 2001 WL 1504452 (Nov. 28, 2001).

The Court of Appeals reversed, holding police lacked probable cause to arrest Pringle because he was merely the front seat passenger, not the car's owner, and the only evidence supporting his arrest was money in the closed front glove box and drugs hidden in the backseat armrest. Without additional facts available to police at the time of arrest to show that Pringle had knowledge or dominion and control over the drugs, there was not enough PC to arrest him. The Court also held Pringle's confession should have been suppressed as the fruit of an illegal arrest. Though 2 hours passed between arrest and confession, and he was *Mirandized* before confessing, the link was too strong between illegal arrest and confession to overcome illegality. *Pringle v. State*, 2002 WL 2005519 (Aug. 27, 2002) (Raker concurs; Wilner, Harrell, and Battaglia dissent).

911 operators & dispatchers - duty owed to persons calling for help

The Maryland Court of Appeals consolidated 2 separate civil cases against 911 operators which alleged the operators improperly handled calls for assistance. In the Harford County case, several boys gave alcohol to a minor, sexually abused her when she passed out, then left her outside where she later died of hypothermia. They called 911 to have someone check on her, but police were dispatched to the wrong address and did not find her in time. In the Montgomery County case, a woman called 911 for help because her husband was enraged and had hit her; the operator kept her on the line (instead of advising her to flee) by asking questions; during the 40-second call, the husband shot 2 of their children.

The mothers in both cases sued (among others) the 911 operators.

The Court of Appeals cleared up 3 key issues about 911 operators' liability: (1) Public official immunity is granted to a public official performing (without malice) a discretionary act in furtherance of an official duty. Operators are not entitled to public official immunity (Their duties do not meet certain criteria: no exercise of the State's sovereign power, no definite commissioned term, no bond or oath requirement. (2) Under the Good Samaritan doctrine, individuals are liable for their failure to exercise reasonable care in rendering protective services and the individual needing protecting relied on the inadequate protection, where the services were given either 'gratuitously or for consideration.' Plaintiffs argued the operators' salaries were the 'consideration' that brings them under the Good Samaritan doctrine, and that the operators acted improperly by failing to exercise reasonable care. The Court held the Good Samaritan doctrine did not apply because 'consideration' must come from the person assisted, so the operators' salary is not proper 'consideration.' (3) A 911 employee generally owes no duty in tort for the negligent performance of his or her duties to an individual in need of emergency telephone services, unless there is a special relationship between the 911 employee and the individual. For a special relationship to exist, the operator must have acted affirmatively to protect or assist the specific individual, and induced the specific reliance of the individual. Neither a dispatcher's receipt of a call for help nor the dispatch of emergency assistance alone creates a special duty to the person in need of assistance. *Muthukumarana v. Montgomery Co.*; *Fried v. Archer*, 2002 WL 1969655 (Aug. 26, 2002).

The Awards Subcommittee of the Maryland Community Crime Prevention Institute met recently to review the nominations submitted from throughout the State of Maryland for the 2002 Governor's Crime Prevention Awards. After an intensive screening process, the Subcommittee selected the departments, individuals, and programs that met the criteria for recognition by the Governor. This year there are 79 award recipients, each of whom has made outstanding contributions to the furtherance of crime prevention programming in their community or jurisdiction.

Recipients are being honored for activities such as volunteering with local police departments; maintaining and revitalizing Neighborhood Watch groups; offering crime prevention programs for the elderly such as the Cell Phones for Seniors Program; providing programs for college students such as "Absolute Wooze", an alcohol awareness program and the RAD (Rape Aggression Defense) Program; offering programs for youth, such as Explorer Posts and school safety programs; conducting residential and commercial security surveys of homes and businesses; offering crime prevention training to both civilians and law enforcement on numerous crime prevention topics, etc. In addition, ten HotSpot communities representing various regions of Maryland will be receiving awards.

**D.A.R.E. STATE
CORDINATORS OFFICE**

The D.A.R.E. State Training Center conducted a D.A.R.E. Officer Training for officers in Hagerstown, MD on August 18-30, 2002. This training is an intensive 80 hour training seminar that provides officers with the skills and knowledge to teach the D.A.R.E. Curriculum. In addition to providing them with the curriculum and other related topics, it provides the officers with information on communication and presentation skills, teaching methodology and classroom management techniques, stages of chemical use and dependency, family dynamics and adolescent development.

As a result of this seminar the Training Center graduated 28 officers. Twenty one officers are for the Maryland roster, four officers for New York City, one for the State of Maine, one for the State of Rhode Island, and one for Ontario, Canada.

D.A.R.E. International recently contacted the Maryland Police and Correctional Training Commissions, requesting the State D.A.R.E. Training Center conduct a D.A.R.E. Officer Training in Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada on October 20- November 1, 2002. A training team led by Sgt. Gary N. Chatfield and trainers from various agencies from Maryland has been assembled and will be traveling to Saskatchewan to provide the training to officers from the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

SKILLS MANAGER

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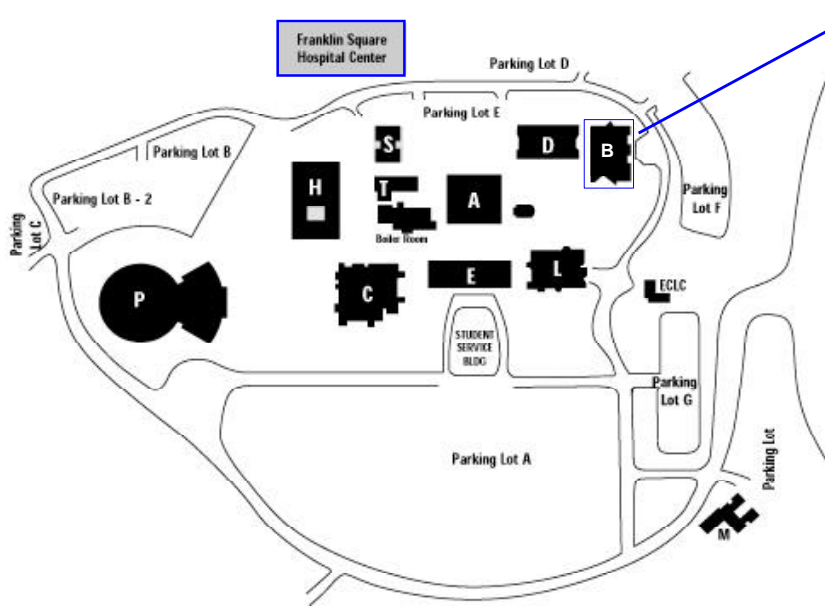

Travel Directions

From Route 29: Take Route 29 until it ends & go left on Route 99. Proceed for about 4 miles to Woodstock Road. Go right on Woodstock Road and proceed for about 2 ½ miles to Hernwood Road. Go left on Hernwood Road for 1 mile to the Commissions on the right.

From Route 695 (Baltimore Beltway): Take Randallstown Exit #18 two miles (5 lights) to Old Court Road. Make a left on Old Court Road and proceed for about 5 miles to Hernwood Road. Go right on Hernwood Road for 1 mile to the Commissions on the right.

From Western MD: Take Route 40 where Routes 40 & 70 split. When on Route 40 take the first left onto Marriottsville Road. Make a right at the first traffic light onto Frederick Road (Route 99). Proceed for 1 mile to Woodstock Road for 2 ½ miles. Then go left on Woodstock Road. Go left on Hernwood Road for 1 mile to the Commissions on the right.

From Westminster: Take Route 140 East to 97 south. Proceed for approximately 10 miles. Take Exit 26 (Liberty Road). Proceed for approximately 11 miles (past Liberty Reservoir). Turn right at Marriottsville Road (traffic light by Getty & Exxon) and proceed for approximately 1.3 miles. Turn left on Hernwood Road. At fork in road, go to the left, then go about 1 mile and the Police and Correctional Training Commissions will be on the left side of the road. Upon entering the driveway, the Academy will be on the left, and the Administration building will be on the right.

Each and every Corrections Officer who comes into contact with inmates will have to use force at one time or another to enforce compliance with the rules. It's just an everyday fact of life in Corrections that inmates don't always obey the rules - something which comes as no surprise to most officers but which still has to be dealt with on a daily basis. So, officers must resort to using some type of force at times to get the problem inmates to do what they are told. But using force, despite the connotation of the word, does not always mean putting your hands on an inmate or getting physical in any way. In fact, the smart officer will avoid a physical confrontation whenever possible.

Using the Force Continuum as our model, this program will look at when officers are allowed to use force against inmates - and what type of force - and when they are not. Special attention is given to exactly when physical force can be used against an inmate and to what degree, and when it cannot be used. The program also looks at the main pitfalls in use of force, such as using excessive force, and what the repercussions can be for the officers involved.

Ethics Toolkit: Enhancing Law Enforcement Ethics in a Community Policing Environment

This kit is a joint effort of the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) and the U.S. Department of Justice Office of Community Oriented Policing services (COPS Office).
