LEADERSHIP CHALLENGE PROGRAM

This program offers public safety executives the opportunity to interact with prominent authorities in diverse fields such as business and industry, health, education, human services, technology and others. This nine-month program (September through June) consists of an overnight retreat, a one-day session per month and a formal graduation ceremony.

EXECUTIVE OFFICER PROGRAMS

These programs were developed to assist top executives in managing their respective public safety agencies. The Police Executive Officer Program is four days in length and the Correctional Executive Officer Program is six days in length.

The topics are specific to Maryland requirements and include presentations on the Training Commissions, performance management, ethics, liability issues, media relations, standards, policies and procedures and others.

MID-MANAGEMENT PROGRAMS

Patterned after the Executive Officer Programs, the topics are geared towards and relate to the job responsibilities of correctional and/or police mid-managers. Two to three days in length.

CAREER TRACK CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

This professional development program is specifically designed for public safety professionals who desire to upgrade their leadership skills in their occupational specialty and to enhance their overall performance. It's designed for optimum agency and individual customization. Agencies and/or individuals may select the particular career-track-courses they need. This process enables individuals to learn new skill sets at a personally controlled pace. Participants are offered a new and better way of learning through a structured yet flexible curriculum.

INSTRUCTOR COURSE

A ten day (75 hour) course of instruction will focus on all areas of training officers to safely operate a police vehicle. Liability, policy and legal issues will be discussed. Instructional techniques, styles and course development plus course layouts are presented. Vehicle dynamics, defensive, skill, skid control and emergency/pursuit operations are discussed. Each student is required to demonstrate their proficiency while operating a vehicle in each of the above areas. To successfully complete this course a minimum of 85% is required in all skill areas and 70% in academic presentations. ENTRY-LEVEL COURSE

A five day (40 Hr.) Course of Instruction focusing on all areas of training police recruits how to safely operate a police vehicle. This is done through lecture and practical exercise training. Students will practice various exercises designed to give them a greater sense of vehicle control by eliminating the anxiety caused by “unfamiliarity with the machine.” Eliminating this intimidation will allow the student to “manhandle” the car during practice and “be in charge” of every move the car will make. In doing so, they will gain confidence in knowing that they will be able to skillfully execute evasive maneuvers in emergency situations should one arise.

Attitude training is centered around police officer survival. Students are lectured in the hope that they will develop the mind-set that it is just as easy to die in a car wreck as it is to die while involved in any other police situation and that senseless, reckless, high-speed unprofessional driving is just not worth it. Throughout the training, safety, discipline and common sense in the use of a car is stressed at a level equal to that of firearms discipline.

Each student is required to demonstrate their proficiency while operating a vehicle during various practical exercises to successfully complete this course. A minimum score of 75% is required in all skill areas and on a written examination. This two week program is a basic firearms program for pistol and shotgun for law enforcement and correctional officers. It meets all minimum standards established by the Maryland Police and Correctional Training Commissions. POLICE ENTRANCE LEVEL TRAINING

The Police Entrance Level Training Program is a 24-week, 960-hour course of instruction for members of small and medium sized police agencies. It is an interactive program where a maximum of 24 recruits are assigned to 6-person training squads for problem-based instruction. The focus is on student involvement rather than lecture based learning. Incorporating community-policing strategies throughout the training, the course serves officers from municipal police departments, county sheriff's offices, school and campus police, and home detention units. Instruction includes an 80-hour firearms course that emphasizes judgmental shooting in addition to skill development. The schedule is interwoven with practical police patrol problems, where students, individually or in teams, can develop skills such as interpersonal communication, leadership, evidence collection, photography, fingerprinting, warrant applications, etc. **Fee \$1500.00 (Does not include Ammo, Clothing or Lodging).**

FIRST LINE SUPERVISOR TRAINING PROGRAM

This 10-day program is suitable for both law enforcement and correctional officers and includes interactive, problem solving exercises focusing on the fundamental skills required of all first line supervisors. The 10 day program offers more topic specific practical exercises, which staff believe will provide a “hands on” approach to supervision. All programs fulfill MPCTC mandated requirements. INITIAL LAW ENFORCEMENT RESPONSE TO SUICIDE BOMBING ATTACKS

(ILERSBA)

ILERSBA was designed to provide front line law enforcement officers with the skills and knowledge to effectively interdict and respond to an imminent person-borne suicide bombing attack or an attack involving a vehicle-borne IED. Effective response to a suicide bombing attack requires a multitude of immediate decisions on the part of law enforcement officers. These decisions include safety and legal considerations. The needs assessment for this course indicates a significant training gap in this area. ILERSBA is intended to meet those needs and deal specifically with immediate decisions and actions in face to face encounters of person-borne and vehicle borne IED attacks. The uncertain nature of a suicide bombing threat is a fundamental challenge in the design of initial law enforcement response. Experience has shown that terrorists exploit this uncertainty by altering their behaviors, tactics, and strategies. To reflect the multi-dimensional aspects of a suicide bombing attack, course designers created nearly 40 scenarios that are used with the course participants. These scenarios simulate the numerous instantaneous assessments that law enforcement officers must make during the initial response to an attack. WMD RADIOLOGICAL/NUCLEAR RESPONDER OPERATIONS (PER 240)

This course is delivered throughout the nation to jurisdictions approved by the DHS/NPD and the Centralized Scheduling and Information Desk (CSID). The Cadre conducts a site survey in advance of training to coordinate with local sponsors to identify and schedule classroom and urban training facilities for the practical hands-on training. The course prepares emergency response personnel to respond to an incident involving a radiological or nuclear weapon of mass destruction (WMD), such as a radiological dispersal device (RDD, “dirty bomb”) or an improvised nuclear device (IND). The course begins by giving hands-on experience with radiation fields while learning the basic operation of radiation detectors and dosimeters. Participants are taught to conduct radiological surveys of personnel, vehicles, facilities, and outdoor areas. Hands-on activities blend cognitive knowledge of radiation and instruments with survey techniques used in detecting the presence of radiation, locating radioactive material, and measuring levels of radiation and radiological contamination. Once individual and small team skills are mastered, participants are taught operational considerations when responding to a radiological WMD incident. Participants form operational teams that deal with cadre-evaluated realistic drills involving likely terrorist use of radiological material. The course culminates with an evaluation exercise requiring participant teams, under a unified command, to respond to a scenario in which terrorists attack a facility or public transportation system, disbursing radiological material. Air-purifying respirators may be worn (for training purposes only) during the final exercise for those certified by their organization to wear respirators (bring documentation to the course). **Fee: Free.
