HDU 31	Demonstrate a safe and effective position to assume while interviewing a person.*
HDU 32	Demonstrate safely placing, securing, and removing a compliant individual in a vehicle.*
HDU 33	Demonstrate safely placing, securing, and removing a non-compliant individual in a vehicle.*
HDU 34	Identify the components of defensive driving.
	Identify the importance of knowing a vehicle's capability and how it relates to defensive driving.
	Identify qualities of a good driver, such as driving within own limitations, maintaining good physical
	condition, using mature judgment, knowing rules of the road, and being rested and alert.
	Identify hazards of driving at night, such as reduced visibility and over-driving headlights.

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	Identify the importance of knowing traffic conditions in all directions.
	Identify conditions which affect the stopping distance of a vehicle, such as driver, vehicle, road, and
	weather.
	Identify in proper sequence the components that make up total stopping distance: perception of danger,
	decision time, reaction time, braking distance.
HDU 35	Identify driver attitudes or conditions that contribute to the occurrence of traffic collisions.
	Identify the effects that over-confidence, self-righteousness, impatience, preoccupation, and fatigue have
	upon a driver's ability to operate a vehicle.
	Identify driving activities that most frequently contribute to collisions, such as backing up, parking, left

HDU 36	Identify circumstances of a HDU Officer's liability and exemption from liability when operating an
	emergency vehicle.  Identify the "privileges" extended to officers in Maryland Law (21-106) when operating an emergency
	vehicle.
	Identify "due caution or due regard" as it pertains to operating an emergency vehicle.
HDU 37	Demonstrate inspecting an assigned vehicle.*
HDU 38	Demonstrate maneuvering a vehicle forward and backward in restricted space areas.*

HDU 44	Demonstrate techniques of collision avoidance.*
HDU 45	Demonstrate proper procedure for operating an emergency vehicle during adverse weather conditions.*
HDU 46	Demonstrate proper braking, steering, and acceleration methods while operating a vehicle during a skid situation.*
	Identify techniques for regaining control of a vehicle experiencing an under-steer situation.
	Identify techniques for regaining control of a vehicle experiencing an over-steer situation.
	Identify techniques for regaining control of a vehicle experiencing an all-wheel skid.
HDU 47	Demonstrate safely operating and controlling a vehicle during a response.

- "Identify" objectives refer to knowledge.
- "Given a scenario" objectives refer to the application of knowledge. The scenario may be hypothetical, or it may be physically acted out.
- "Demonstrate" objectives require physical demonstration of a skill and/or a physically acted out scenario. These demonstrated objectives are indicated with an asterisk (\*).
